lesterol content. If any of these substances are found to elevated in the blood, students are given dietary counsel and special treatment under a physician's guidance.

There is no charge for the examinations, which are carried out by U of I physicians, nurses, and nutritionists, aided by Muscatine school nurs-

Results of all examinations are held in strict confidence and are reported only to parents and family physicians.

The U of I project has been approved by the Muscatine Community School District and the Muscatine County Medical Society. Muscatine was chosen as the site for the study because of its stable school enrollment and the excellent cooperation of school and health professionals.

The study, started with funds last year from the Iowa Regional Medical Program at the U of I, will be supported this year with funds from the newly-established Specialized Center of Research. The U of I was selected as the site for the Center by the National

## Two council terms expire here Nov. 2

Terms of two members of the Muscatine city council who were appointed to fill vacancies will expire Nov. 2 deputy city clerk Norbert Liebbe said today. Terms of the five other elected council members do not expire until Dec. 31.

John Duncan was appointed earlier this year to fill the vacancy created when fifth ward alderman Vernon Wilson moved to a different ward and resigned from the council. Harold Peters was appointed last year when first Ward alderman Duane Keough moved from the city.

Liebbe said he had checked with city attorney Jon Pearce and was informed that the Iowa Code (Section 69.11) provides that aldermen appointed by the council shall serve only until the next election.

Duncan and Peters could file petitions to be elected to fill the "short term" of November and December. Other candidates could also file for the short term, or write-in candidates could be elected.

Duncan has indicated he will be a candidate for re-election for a full two-year term. Peters has not formally announced.

Today was the first day for nomination papers to be filed in the office of the city clerk. First candidates to file were Mayor E.S. Burns, and councilman-at-large Ron Hansen, seeking re-election.

Little is known about the prevalence and incidence of certain disease risk factors in children, and U of I physicians note that students participating in the Muscatine project will help provide data that may mean better health not only for themselves but for many persons in the nation in the future.

Louisa county raised \$2,478 this year, exceeding its goal by \$78. Last year the county raised \$2,432. The chairman this year was Mrs. F. Max Schomberg.

Cedar county workers raised \$2,410, which was 80.3 per cent of the \$3,000 goal. A year ago there was \$2,159 raised in Cedar county.
