Ransom McKee, who was on the school board when the vo-ag course was initiated.

"I would also like to thank," Hoopes said, "my wife and the rest of my family, who were tolerant to my escapades while teaching, and the alumni and vo-ag old-timers group."

Beitz traced changes in the vo-ag program during his 12 years at MHS, as did McKendrick for his three years and Hetzler, who is starting his fourth year here.

Daryl Sywassink, state FFA president, brought a

message on behalf of the state organization, noting that "FFA has gone a long ways and it's going more." He also urged adults to take the time to listen to the young people of today.

In the main address, Gifford said he had many fond recollections of Muscatine. He said there had been many changes since he left "the Riveria of Iowa" (Muscatine), but that the high bridge was still the same.

Gifford defended wheat and grain sales to Russia and said reports of suppressing information on the transaction

were completely false. As another part of his talk, Gifford presented extensive research he'd done on agriculture as it was in 1922, the year vo-ag started here.

"Pretty much the same" Except for differences in prices caused through inflation, Gifford said there's "merely a new exterior, but underneath things are pretty much the same."

He noted that some of the worries in 1922 were pollution, takedown in morality and religion, motion picture subjects and the flouting and disrespect for the law.

Gifford, who has traveled throughout the world, said "You can roam the world and never find anything better than you people have here right in this area. You can't beat the silt loam here, you have the agricultural and industrial tools and a society that believes in hard work."

"The people here are honest and friendly," he went on, "and you have great recreational outlets. You are living in the Garden of Eden as close to anywhere in the world."

Directing his final remarks to Hoopes, Gifford said, "You have been one of the greatest revolutionists of all time. You have led a peaceful revolution of change in vocational agriculture and everyone is the better for it."

At the conclusion of his talk, Gifford was presented a plaque by Ralph Sywassink as a momento of the occasion.

## Fatal shooting is investigated by army, police

BELFAST (AP) — The army and police are investigating the fatal shooting of a Protestant youth whose family said he was partially deaf and could not hear militiamen shouting at him to halt.

Alexander Moorehead, 17, of Newtonwards, County Tyrone, was one of two persons killed during the weekend in Northern Ireland as the three-year death toll from sectarian violence rose to at least 597.

Members of the Ulster Defense Regiment, the province's militia, said Moorehead was seen carrying an object and trying to scale a wall shortly after a bomb had been thrown at a military patrol.

The militiamen said they called for him to stop and then fired when he continued over the wall. No weapon was found near his body.

DETROIT (AP) — American League President Joe Cronin announced today that shortstop Bert Campaneris of the Oakland Athletics has been suspended for the remainder of AL playoffs and fined \$500 for throwing a bat during Sunday's game against Detroit.

The suspension, Cronin said, is only for the duration of the playoff championship series. The A's lead the best-of-five series 2-0. Should they win, Campaneris would be eligible for the World Series.

In notifying Campaneris of his suspension and fine, Cronin said:

"Such action cannot and will not be tolerated."

## Girl sympathetic to man that held her as a hostage

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — "I hope the man wasn't hurt too bad because I guess he needs someone to take care of him," said 10-year-old Michele Pratts after being held hostage with 13 other persons by a teen-age gunman.

Police said the gunman, identified as 17-year-old Jackson Stallings, was shot in the neck by police to end his 16-hour hold on the hostages Saturday. He was reported in satisfactory condition at an Orlando hospital today.

Nine of the hostages ranged in age from 10 to 17.

# 9 die in weekend accidents

Nine persons were killed on Iowa highways in traffic accidents over the weekend.

Dean Owens, 17, Winfield, was killed Sunday in a single-car accident one mile north of Winfield on a county road. Henry County Sheriff's deputies said Owens died when his car struck a bridge. A passenger in his car, Wayne McAllister, 17, rural Winfield, was under treatment at a Mount Pleasant hospital.

Three persons were killed when two separate cars struck an Illinois Central train west of Cedar Rapids Saturday.

Iowa State Troopers said Anna Adams, 42, Decorah, was killed when a car driven by her husband, Hugh Adams, 46, collided with the train engine at a county blacktop road.

Adams and the couple's two sons, Neil, 9, and Brian, 10, were hospitalized.

About 10 minutes after the first accident, the then-stopped train was struck by a car driven by Louis Joseph Cardis, 38, Cedar Rapids. Authorities said both Cardis and his passenger, Charlotte Mae Bailey, 22, Cedar Rapids, were killed.

Helen Bonna Lee Clark, 51, Marion, and Randy Eveiland, 9, Marion, were dead on arrival at a Cedar Rapids hospital following a car-semi trailer accident Sunday north of Marion.

State Troopers said the Clark car failed to stop at a stop sign and was struck broadside by a semi-trailer driven by Virgil

Carver, 47, Rowley.

Another passenger in the Clark car, Karen Kempf, 12, Marion, was taken to University Hospitals in Iowa City where she was listed in serious condition. Carver was taken to a Cedar Rapids hospital.

Linda Kay Foster, 19, Des Moines, was killed Saturday in the collision of her car and one driven by Iowa Asst. Atty. Gen. Thomas McGrane in West Des Moines. Police said McGrane failed to stop for a traffic signal and charged him with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

Two young women were killed in a one-car accident Saturday on a county road four miles east of Pleasantville. Victims were identified as Virginia

Lambert, 22, and Doris Verwers, 18, both of Des Moines. Officers said they were passengers in a car driven by Dwight Clark Jr., 22, Melcher.

## Medical, migrant school reports on agenda tonight

Reports on a medical study, the summer migrant program, and status of the new high school design will be given at tonight's meeting of the Muscatine Community school district board of education.

Dr. Ronald M. Lauer, professor of pediatrics at the University of Iowa, will report to the school board on the "high risk factor" program which was started here in 1970. The program seeks to identify school children who have high risk factors of coronary artery disease (hardening of the arteries).

Jerry Lange, principal of Franklin elementary school,

and director of the migrant summer school program, will give an evaluation report of the 1972 migrant school session. If authorized by the board following the report, Lange will prepare an application to secure funding for the 1973 migrant program.

Representatives of the architectural firm, Kingscott and Associates, Davenport, will report on the present status of the design of the proposed new Muscatine high school.

Meeting of the school board begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building on Park Avenue and are open to the public.

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## 'Civilisation' film series slated

The Iowa State Arts Council will present the universally acclaimed film series, "Civilisation," at the Musser Public Library beginning Oct. 11. "Civilisation" is a series of 13 52-minute color films, a personal view of the ideas and events of the last sixteen hundred years in history of Western man, created and narrated by Sir Kenneth Clark.

The programs, produced by the British Broadcasting Corporation and first seen in Great Britain, debuted in the United States at the National Gallery of Art in Washington and to guests of New York University and the Metropolitan Museum of the Art in New York.

The thousands of people

who returned time and time again to follow Kenneth Clark's scholarly and sprightly progression through Western cultural history came from all areas of activity to see the extraordinary collection of paintings, sculptures, buildings, places and people that comprise the films. But in the end it was Lord Clark himself, who drew them back, showing after showing.

More recently, the series has been seen on both the NET and CBS television networks.

The individual films will be shown over a period of the months ahead. The series begins Wednesday, Oct. 11 at 7 p.m. in the library meeting room.
