

Weber recalls memories...

Education, when Weber assumed the CHS principalship in 1952. The climate on the CHS campus in 1952 was described by Weber as having "good spirit," as the school commenced on a building renewal program.

The cities of Lyons and Clinton had merged in 1895, but the two school districts did not consolidate until 1947.

In 1953, one year after arriving on the CHS scene, Weber was deeply involved in preparations to combine the two high schools.

"It was a very controversial issue at that time. I kept hearing that it would never work. However, we got busy, and during that year we got the groups of students together and mandated that there had to be representation of the students coming from Lyons High School as officers in clubs and on the council."

Recalling the year of consolidation, Weber added, "We started the school year together in 1954. At first, there was kind of a pause in which the two groups, who were intended to join, held their breath to see if it would really work."

"It was one of the most wonderful, enjoyable years I can remember. It was a challenge, but the student leaders from both groups put everything into making it work. I really think there was more adult resistance than student resistance."

Fire another milestone

The Jan. 8, 1968, high school fire also was another milestone experienced by Weber during his tenure at CHS. "At the time, it felt like a fantastic tragedy. My first thoughts were, 'My goodness, what are we going to do now?'"

"However, the fire proved that there's always a way of working out a problem, even though the solution may not always be ideal. In this case, the students only lost five days of school, before classes were back in session."

Before assuming the CHS post, Weber had served as assistant principal and director of guidance at Muscatine High School and Junior College for four years.

His educational experience also included serving as a teacher and coach at Muscatine High and junior college, head coach of junior college basketball, high school football and track from 1935 to 1948. The years, 1944 to 1946, were interrupted, as the Muscatine native left the classroom, and served as a Navy gunnery officer in the Pacific.

Weber received a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1935 and 1951, respectively. Additional study has included attendance at a curriculum seminar at Columbia University, workshops at the University of Colorado and University of Indiana, National Institute of Science and National Institute of Social Studies at the University of Iowa and institutes on modular flexible scheduling and teacher education and professional standards at the University of Iowa.

In addition, Weber's involvement in educational organizations has included serving as president of the Iowa State Education Association in 1956, on the ISEA board of directors in 1957, state coordinator of the Iowa Association of Secondary School Principals for 18 years, and on the National Association of Secondary School Principals' board of directors from 1971-1975.

Concerning his decision to enter the educational profession, Weber said, "I believe I became an educator, and remained one for 41 years, because of my continuing desire to help youngsters become mature young women and men. Through all these years, I've been very happy in, and have loved, my work. My heart kept receiving messages reflecting beauty, courage, joy and excitement. This has kept me young, at least in outlook."

Intend to stay in Clinton

Weber took an early retirement after suffering a heart attack. The Webers reside at 711 Elmhurst Ct., and commenting on their decision to remain in Clinton, Weber noted, "In the 24 years my wife, Laura, and I have lived in Clinton, we have discovered friends to be such a great asset, and love is the most important thing on earth. We have both — friends and love — in Clinton, and intend to stay in Clinton through our retirement years."

In addition to reading a great deal, enjoying the constant companionship of his apparent treasure, his dog, Misty, and having plans to get back on the golf course next summer, Weber also attends home athletic games and various other school activities.

"I can't let go of my interest in school events, because it's in the activities where you see a side of a young person that you don't see anywhere else."

"I used to stop in and watch the practices in various activities, because you can see values in persons that perhaps may never become apparent, when they are in the classroom or walking down the halls."

Cites values of activities

Commenting on the importance of the extra-curricular program, the former CHS principal said, "Such activities do make a contribution to the growth and development of the individual."

"There have been so many examples over the years. In the speech program, students as sophomores start debate, and by the time they are seniors they have developed so much confidence and poise. Any one of the activities can be used as an example. In dramatics, how can anyone think that it's easy to memorize lines and perform before groups of people. In band, look at the changes made by Dave Gaulrapp, and I think the CHS music department is one of the best."

"I also think that it is so fantastic that there is a full athletic program for the girls," he continued. "If we thought we had some real tigers with the boys, there are some real competitors with the girls' groups."

"During my years at CHS, there have been some wonderful, wonderful student groups. I cannot think of a time, when I had asked for assistance in solving a problem or with some kind of troublesome situation, they had not been cooperative."

"I believe the quality of students attending Clinton High School is excellent. We should expect the very best from our students and should tell them so. We then should do our very best to help the students achieve to their maximum. It is a fact CHS graduates, who have made an effort as students, compete very well as they enter the adult world."

'Loved my work'

"I have loved my work, because out of problems or negative situations, the very worst of them, could, and would become something positive, which would be very helpful in the future."

"The happy-times predominated by a great majority, which permits me to say that I have always been proud of the representation our River Queens and Kings have given to our school and community."
